



Hello girls and boys. I hope you had a great week. Today we're going to talk about one of the most famous stories in the Bible. Have you ever heard the story about when Daniel, from the Old Testament, was thrown into the lion's den? It's a really great story about faith and trusting God. Daniel was a Jewish man who was taken as a prisoner into a foreign country. After he was there for a while he became one of the king's closest advisors and a governor over other advisors who were natives of the country. This made those other advisors very jealous.

Have you ever been jealous of someone? Maybe a brother or sister? How about of a friend or someone at school? Maybe they got a special toy for their birthday that you always wanted... We all can get jealous sometimes. The problem with being jealous is it can lead us to do other bad things. In the story of Daniel, the jealous advisors convinced the king to make a law that required everyone to pray only to the king and not to God.

What do you think Daniel did? That's right, he continued to pray to God not once or twice, but three times every day, just as he always did. Do you think he hid in his bedroom to pray? Nope, he prayed right in front of his open window where everyone could see. His praying was noticed by the jealous advisors and they went running right away to the king to tattle on Daniel. The king liked Daniel and was very sad that he had made the law about praying, but he was stuck. He had to punish Daniel for praying and so the king had Daniel thrown into a den where hungry lions lived. Do you think Daniel was eaten by those hungry lions? Nope, God sent an angel who kept the lions' mouths completely closed all night long. The next morning when the king opened the opening they all saw that God had protected Daniel from all those hungry lions.

We can learn a lot from Daniel. First he prayed at least 3 times every day and he trusted God. Because he trusted God Daniel wasn't afraid of those Hungry lions. We can also learn about how jealousy can lead to really bad things.

Let's pray... Dear God, thank you for the story of the brave hero Daniel. Help us to trust in you when we're afraid. When we're jealous of others, help us to count our own blessings instead of wanting things that belong to others. Amen.

# • A READING OF SCRIPTURE: Daniel 6:6-27

R: Our scripture reading is from Daniel, Chapter 6.

# C: Glory to you, O Lord.

<sup>6</sup>So the presidents and satraps conspired and came to the king and said to him, "O King Darius, live forever! <sup>7</sup>All the presidents of the kingdom, the prefects and the satraps, the counselors and the governors are agreed that the king should establish an ordinance and enforce an interdict, that whoever prays to anyone, divine or human, for thirty days, except to you, O king, shall be thrown into a den of lions. <sup>8</sup>Now, O king, establish the interdict and sign the document, so that it cannot be changed, according to the law of the Medes and the Persians, which cannot be revoked." <sup>9</sup>Therefore King Darius signed the document and interdict. <sup>10</sup>Although Daniel knew that the document had been signed, he continued to go to his house, which had windows in its upper room open toward Jerusalem, and to get down on his knees three times a day to pray to his God and praise him, just as he had done previously.

<sup>11</sup>The conspirators came and found Daniel praying and seeking mercy before his God. <sup>12</sup>Then they approached the king and said concerning the interdict, "O king! Did you not sign an interdict, that anyone who prays to anyone, divine or human, within thirty days except to you, O king, shall be thrown into a den of lions?" The king answered, "The thing stands fast, according to the law of the Medes and Persians, which cannot be revoked." <sup>13</sup>Then they responded to the king, "Daniel, one of the exiles from Judah, pays no attention to you, O king, or to the interdict you have signed, but he is saying his prayers three times a day." <sup>14</sup>When the king heard the charge, he was very much distressed. He was determined to save Daniel, and until the sun went down he made every effort to rescue him. <sup>15</sup>Then the conspirators came to the king and said to him, "Know, O king, that it is a law of the Medes and Persians that no interdict or ordinance that the king establishes can be changed." <sup>16</sup>Then the king gave the command, and Daniel was brought and thrown into the den of lions. The king said to Daniel, "May your God, whom you faithfully serve, deliver you!" <sup>17</sup>A stone was brought and laid on the mouth of the den, and the king sealed it with his own signet and with the signet of his lords, so that nothing might be changed concerning Daniel.

<sup>18</sup>Then the king went to his palace and spent the night fasting; no food was brought to him, and sleep fled from him. <sup>19</sup>Then, at break of day, the king got up and hurried to the den of lions. <sup>20</sup>When he came near the den where Daniel was, he cried out anxiously to Daniel, "O Daniel, servant of the living God, has your God whom you faithfully serve been able to deliver you from the lions?" <sup>21</sup>Daniel then said to the king, "O king, live forever! <sup>22</sup>My God sent his angel and shut the lions"

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mouths so that they would not hurt me, because I was found blameless before him; and also before you, O king, I have done no wrong." <sup>23</sup>Then the king was exceedingly glad and commanded that Daniel be taken up out of the den. So Daniel was taken up out of the den, and no kind of harm was found on him, because he had trusted in his God. <sup>24</sup>The king gave a command, and those who had accused Daniel were brought and thrown into the den of lions—they, their children, and their wives. Before they reached the bottom of the den the lions overpowered them and broke all their bones in pieces.

<sup>25</sup>Then King Darius wrote to all peoples and nations of every language throughout the whole world: "May you have abundant prosperity! <sup>26</sup>I make a decree, that in all my royal dominion people should tremble and fear before the God of Daniel: For he is the living God, enduring forever. His kingdom shall never be destroyed, and his dominion has no end. <sup>27</sup>He delivers and rescues, he works signs and wonders in heaven and on earth; for he has saved Daniel from the power of the lions.".

R: This is the Word of the Lord!

# C: Praise to You, O Christ (Spoken)

# • SERMON Pr. Mel Musser Grace and peace to you from God our Father and from the real Lion of

Judah, Jesus Christ our Savior and our Lord, amen.

Today's story from the book of Daniel is probably the most famous of all the tales from this book. This is the last of the royal court stories. Our final two weeks will focus on the section of Daniel that deals mostly with future prophecy. Every time I think about the book of Daniel, the first thing that pops into my mind is this story about Daniel in the lion's den. (SLIDE) You might say Daniel and his friends are constantly going from the frying pan into the fire... The story of Daniel in the lion's den closely resembles the one we focused on last week with Daniel's friends Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego. In both stories the civil servants of the king were jealous of the authority and power given by the king to these foreigners.

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Last week I said the 3 Amigos refused to bend, but this week Daniel refused not to bend. (SLIDE) My favorite line from this story is from verse 10, "Although Daniel knew that the document had been signed, he continued to go to his house, which had windows in its upper room open toward Jerusalem, and to get down on his knees three times a day to pray to his God and praise him, just as he had done previously." When things got heated up for Daniel, he didn't pray in panic, he continued to pray with his windows open toward Jerusalem, just as was his normal custom. Not crying out to the Lord with fear and trembling, but three times each and every day. His prayer life had become a habit. It was his normal routine and he got down on his knees. Did you know there are well over 250 times in the Bible when people are referred to as kneeling to pray? Even Jesus knelt in prayer in the Garden of Gethsemane on the night he was betrayed. (SLIDE) When we kneel to pray we are taking the posture of humility. We're not approaching the throne of the almighty and living God as equals. We're not there to offer our advice nor to tell God what to do or how to handle our problem or situation. We're there to receive from God not to give to God.

Daniel had, by this time already displayed his worth to the King. (SLIDE) He had interpreted the king's dream and had proven himself to be a good and faithful servant administering governmental services to the Babylonian population. As the people under his authority began to thrive, so did Daniel's rank and status in

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the King's court. There were somewhere around 120 Satraps appointed under King Darius. A Satrap is similar to a local governmental official, like a mayor. Over these 120 or so Satraps Darius appointed 3 governors to supervise the Satraps. Daniel was one of these governors. He was so successful the gossip all over the kingdom was that Darius intended to appoint Daniel as the sole governor over the entire kingdom. Now, you can imagine the petty jealousy of the Satraps and the other two governors who were about to be passed over in favor of this foreigner. That's what led to today's palace intrigue. These satraps and other governors used the FBI, the CIA, the IRS, and every other government agencies to examine Daniel and his official as well as his private life under their magnifying glass. (SLIDE) They looked under his bed, they looked in his closet, they turned over every rock. Despite all this intense scrutiny, they found no affairs with porn stars, no falsified crooked books, no false or misleading statements. Despite the fact that Daniel was nearly 90 years old, they found no evidence of mental or physical failure. His mind and his body were still as sharp as ever. The only thing they could find was his devotion to the God of his fathers, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob. (SLIDE) He worshipped the one true, living God and his devotion to God would not and could not be bought or compromised. Daniel's body was old, but his mind and his attitudes were still in the springtime of his life. He was faithful in the discharge of his duties and he gave a full days' work for a full days' wage. He did

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what was to be done, when it was to be done, the way it was supposed to be done. He was the best employee Darius had. That is, until Daniel's jealous colleagues convinced Darius to pass a decree that went against everything Daniel stood for.

Daniel's response to this unjust law wasn't so much an act of defiance as it was an act of discipline. (SLIDE) For Daniel, prayer was a holy habit. It was as natural for Daniel to pray three times a day as it was to eat three times a day. It would have been so convenient to compromise. Daniel could have said, "Well, I'll just pray in secret." He could have said, "I'll just pray silently." He could have said, "I must obey the ones in authority over me." He could have said, "I haven't missed praying for almost ninety years; thirty days is not going to hurt." But Daniel had decided he would rather die for a conviction, than to live by a compromise. Thank God Daniel was a politician who not only believed character was important, but that convictions are more important than being popular or winning elections. If only today's politicians actually believed in something other than their hatred for the other side of the aisle.

It takes courage to walk into the lions' den. (SLIDE) Daniel had a quiet courage. Evidently he never said a word. He didn't say anything to the king because he didn't have to; he had been talking to the King of Kings. Someone once defined courage as fear that has said its prayers. Remember, Daniel's only crime was praying... Maybe Daniel remembered the Proverb: "Do not be afraid of

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sudden terror, nor of trouble from the wicked when it comes; for the Lord will be your confidence, and will keep your foot from being caught." I can't say what Daniel was thinking, but one thing I know, he didn't go limping into that lion's lair with fear; he went leaping into that lion's lair with faith. (SLIDE) I know this is obvious to most of you, but it bears saying anyway. God didn't save Daniel from the lions' den, He saved him *in* the lions' den. Don't think it's strange if you are thrown into the lions' den. In fact, these days you might think it's strange if you are not. I read a story this week about Martin Niemoller, who was a great German pastor during World Was II. (SLIDE) You might have heard his famous 1946 poem, "First they came ...". The poem exists in many versions; the one featured on the United States Holocaust Memorial reads: "First they came for the socialists, and I did not speak out – because I was not a socialist. Then they came for the trade unionists, and I did not speak out – because I was not a trade unionist. Then they came for the Jews, and I did not speak out – because I was not a Jew. Then they came for me – and there was no one left to speak for me." Pastor Niemoller stood up to the Nazis and stood up for the Jewish people. Finally, Hitler threw him into prison. As he was sitting in his jail cell, the prison chaplain came to visit him, and sat down and said, "Brother, why are you in this jail cell?" To which Martin Niemoller replied, "Brother, why are you not in this jail cell?"

We don't need to be looking for lions' dens, but we don't need to be running from them either. I don't know who wrote these words that I am about to read, but they certainly could have been written by Daniel himself: "I am part of the Fellowship of the Unashamed. (SLIDE) I have the Holy Spirit's power. The die has been cast; I have stepped over the line. The decision has been made. I am a disciple of Jesus Christ. I won't look up, let up, slow down, back away, or be still. My past is redeemed, my present makes sense, and my future is secure. I am finished and done with low living, sight-walking, small planning, smooth knees, colorless dreams, tame visions, mundane talking, chintzy giving, and tiny goals. I no longer need preeminence, prosperity, position, promotions, positive feedback or popularity. I don't have to be right, first, tops, recognized, praised, regarded, or rewarded. I now live by faith and love by God's grace. I'm lifted by prayer, and labor by power of the Holy Spirit. My pace is set, my gate is fast, my goal is the Kingdom of God, my road is narrow, my way is rough, my companions few, my guide reliable, my mission clear. I cannot be bought, compromised, deterred, lured away, turned back, diluted, or delayed. I will not flinch in the face of sacrifice, hesitate in the presence of adversity, negotiate at the table of the enemy, ponder at the pool of popularity, or meander in the maze of mediocrity. I won't give up, back up, let up, or shut up, until I've preached up, prayed up, stored up, and stayed up for the cause of Christ. (SLIDE) I am a disciple of Jesus Christ. I must carry on

until Jesus returns, give until I drop, preach until all know the name above all names, and work until He comes."

May we all have the same level of conviction and integrity as Daniel. May you face the lions' dens in your life with courage, knowing Jesus Christ has already prepared your safe space in the Kingdom of God where the lion of Judah will be your sure defense. May these little lions never cause you to stumble or falter, but only serve to increase your faith in the God who shuts the mouths of

lions. Amen.





The communicant may say: Amen.




