

## • CHILDREN'S MESSAGE



**Theme**: God Provides **Materials**: A Stuffed Lamb

**Scripture**: Genesis 21:1-3; 22:1-14

Bring a stuffed lamb or a small toy sheep as a prop. Good morning, boys and girls! Today I want to tell you a story about Abraham and his son Isaac. Abraham was a man who lived a long time ago in the Old Testament. He and his wife Sarah were very old and they had no children. One day they were visited by an Angel of God who brought them a message from God. They were going to have a baby, even though they were both nearly 100 years old... It took God over 24 years before he finally gave them the son he had promised them. Can you imagine how much Abraham and Sarah loved their son, Isaac?

One day God asked Abraham to take Isaac up a mountain and offer a sacrifice. Isaac thought it was odd that they had no lamb, bull, or even a tiny Turtle Dove to offer God, but He trusted his father Abraham and they both trusted God. On the way, Isaac worked up the curiosity and the courage to ask a really important question: "Where is the lamb for the sacrifice?"

Now, let's play a little game. Somewhere in this sanctuary, I've hidden a stuffed lamb. Can you help me find it? Go ahead, look around... The first one to find the lamb gets a special prize...

(Let the children look around until they find the stuffed lamb. When they bring it up, hold it up high.)

You found it! In the Bible story, Abraham didn't know where the lamb was either, but he trusted God. And sure enough, God provided a lamb caught in the bushes so that Isaac would be safe.

This story reminds us that God always provides what we need. And later on, God provided the greatest Lamb of all—Jesus. Jesus is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world. Because of Jesus, we know God's love will always be there for us.

Let's pray... Dear God, thank you for always providing everything we need. Thank you for loving us more than we deserve and thank you for Jesus, the Lamb of God who takes away all our sin. Amen.

## • A READING OF SCRIPTURE: Genesis 21:1-3; 22:1-14

R: Our scripture reading is from Genesis, Chapters 21 & 22.

C: Glory to you, O Lord.

2 1 The Lord dealt with Sarah as he had said, and the Lord did for Sarah as he had promised. <sup>2</sup>Sarah conceived and bore Abraham a son in his old age, at the time of which God had spoken to him. <sup>3</sup>Abraham gave the name Isaac to his son whom Sarah bore him.

22 After these things God tested Abraham. He said to him, "Abraham!" And he said, "Here I am." <sup>2</sup>He said, "Take your son, your only son Isaac, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah, and offer him there as a burnt offering on one of the mountains that I shall show you."

<sup>3</sup>So Abraham rose early in the morning, saddled his donkey, and took two of his young men with him, and his son Isaac; he cut the wood for the burnt offering, and set out and went to the place in the distance that God had shown him. <sup>4</sup>On the third day Abraham looked up and saw the place far away. <sup>5</sup>Then Abraham said to his young men, "Stay here with the donkey; the boy and I will go over there; we will worship, and then we will come back to you." <sup>6</sup>Abraham took the wood of the burnt offering and laid it on his son Isaac, and he himself carried the fire and the knife. So the two of them walked on together. <sup>7</sup>Isaac said to his father Abraham, "Father!" And he said, "Here I am, my son." He said, "The fire and the wood are here, but where is the lamb for a burnt offering?" <sup>8</sup>Abraham said, "God himself will provide the lamb for a burnt offering, my son." So the two of them walked on together. <sup>9</sup>When they came to the place that God had shown him, Abraham built an altar there and laid the wood in order. He bound his son Isaac, and laid him on the altar, on top of the wood. <sup>10</sup>Then Abraham reached out his hand and took the knife to kill his son.

<sup>11</sup>But the angel of the Lord called to him from heaven, and said, "Abraham, Abraham!" And he said, "Here I am." <sup>12</sup>He said, "Do not lay your hand on the boy or do anything to him; for now I know that you fear God, since you have not withheld your son, your only son, from me." <sup>13</sup>And Abraham looked up and saw a ram, caught in a thicket by its horns. Abraham went and took the ram and offered it up as a burnt offering instead of his son. <sup>14</sup>So Abraham called that place "The Lord will provide"; as it is said to this day, "On the mount of the Lord it shall be provided."

• SERMON Pr Mel Musser

Grace and peace to you from God our Father and from our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Amen.

It finally happened. We weren't waiting 24 years, but after almost a year of waiting and working toward her goal, PJ was finally ready for her surgery.

(SLIDE) I, on the other hand, was not so ready. I mean this was a 5 hour long surgery for cosmetic purposes only. She was ready, but I was afraid. The good news is she came through her surgery with flying colors and is well on the road to recovery. I have to say, seeing what she went through, especially those first two or three days, made me wonder if it was worth it. Her surgeon tells us, when it's all healed, she will be very happy with the results, even if it's hard to see that now...

I think that's a tiny smidgeon of what Abraham and Sarah experienced.

(SLIDE) After all the waiting, for more than 24 years!... After all the prayers, after all the wondering if God had forgotten them, Abraham and Sarah finally had a baby. Isaac, the name in Hebrew literally means laughter. After all this time of trusting and doubting, Sarah and Abraham finally got to hold laughter itself in their arms. (SLIDE) It was a miracle that came long after hope should have been gone. Sarah was well past childbearing years, Abraham was over a hundred years old, and yet, as the scripture says: "The Lord did for Sarah as he had promised." Now, you'd think that would be the end of the story. God made a promise. God kept it.

Roll the credits. Nothing more to see here... If that's what you thought, you're in for many more surprises along God's journey.

As we move into chapter 22 of Genesis, God's story takes a turn no one could have predicted or expected. If we over-analyze this story it can become a truly terrifying text. (SLIDE) God tells Abraham to take Isaac—the son he had waited for, the son of the promise, the joy of his old age—and sacrifice him as a burnt offering on some distant mountain. I have to admit, this is one of the hardest passages in the Bible for me to wrap my head around. It's supposed to make us uncomfortable. Abraham gets up early the next morning, takes Isaac, gathers wood, and climbs the mountain. Every parent in this room shudders at the thought. Do you think he told Sarah where they were going? Every child wonders, "Would God ask that of me?" When I come upon really hard texts like this one, I compare what God is doing in this story to what God has doing in other stories. I start by looking at the immediate verses around the story to see if the context can shed light on the meaning. Then, I look at other books or writings from that same author or in the same genre or type of writing. For example, if the scripture I'm trying to understand is from one of Paul's Letters, I would look to see if Paul addressed the same topic in another letter. As I made my deep dive into the surrounding context I kept thinking about the overarching narrative of God's relationship with God's creation. When I look at the ways God interacts with us and all of god's creation, I

don't find a God who is arbitrary or capricious. I don't find a God who gives good gifts, only to take them back later... Instead, what I find through out the Bible is a God who loves all peoples and everything in His Good creation. My conclusion is, God never intended Isaac's death. The story is about trust, not slaughter. (SLIDE) When I look back on those times in my life when I had to overcome adversity, I always try to give God the credit for providing the strength to persevere or the wisdom to discover a way out of my dilemma. The thing is, in the moment, I rarely recognize God's provision. At least for me, that "AHA" moment usually comes after the fact, when I can process whatever that was that I just came through... In the moment, Abraham doesn't know God has already planted that Ram in the thickets. Despite not knowing what God had in store, Abraham, and Isaac too, walked step by step in faith, neither one knowing the outcome....

I suspect you've been there too. We all face tests, maybe not literal life and death tests, but we've all been tested to our limits. Maybe you've stood on your own Mount Moriah. (SLIDE) For some, it's sitting in the doctor's office, waiting for test results. For others, it's crying at the graveside of someone you love. For our farmers, right now it means watching the skies and listening to the weather guessers on TV and the Radio. For parents, it's sending a child off into a world where no place is completely safe, and praying, "Lord, please take care of them when I can't." Our faith gets tested in the dark valleys of life. Most of the time,

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like Abraham, we don't know what God is doing. All we can do is walk forward, one step at a time, and trust God can and will make good come out of the evil we humans can't seem to avoid.

At the last moment, as Abraham lifts the knife, the angel of the Lord calls out: "Do not lay your hand on the boy!" (SLIDE) And suddenly, Abraham sees it: a ram caught in the thicket. God provides. The child is spared. The promise continues. In thankfulness and to honor God, Abraham names the place, "The Lord will provide." The story isn't about a God who takes life, but about a God who preserves life. It's about a God who provides a substitute, who makes a way where there was no way. (SLIDE) Making a way where there was no way brings us all the way to the cross. Centuries later, another Son would climb that mountain. Another only Son, also carrying wood on his back, would walk up the hill, obedient to his Father's will. This time, there would be no ram in the thicket. No substitute. Instead, Jesus became the substitute—for Isaac, for Abraham, for me, for you, and for all peoples. The Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world.

On Mount Calvary, another hilltop, just outside of Jerusalem, the city built on the same mountain where God provided the ram to substitute for Isaac, God's provision was complete. Not in sparing his Son, but in giving him for us all. So that now, in every trial, in every heartbreak, in every moment when faith is tested,

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we can say with confidence: "The Lord will provide." That's what Abraham named that mountain "The Lord will provide." I've had certain times and places in my life where I can look back and see how the hand of God provided, not just materiel possessions, or even emotional or spiritual strength, but everything I needed to get through the situation. For me, the Dayspring Nursing Home where our daughter, Melanie currently resides is such a sacred place. (SLIDE) When we thought Melanie was not going to make it, Dayspring literally nursed her back to health. It is truly a place where God provides. My point is that when I go to Dayspring Skilled Nursing Facility, I don't see patients, nurses, aides housekeeping, and cafeteria workers. What I see is God providing for every need of the souls under their care. For me, Dayspring Nursing Home is a sacred place. It's Holy Ground, every bit as much as the place they call Moriah in Israel... Where is your Holy Ground? It could be a physical place or maybe a season of your life when you've experienced God providing everything you needed to get by when you thought all was lost. In each of those moments, God provides. Maybe not in the way we expect, but most certainly in the way we need it the most.

So, here's the Good News... When faith is tested, when the way is uncertain, when the knife is ready to fall—God always provides. When I went to seminary, I became a little bit of a language and grammar nerd. I love the verb tense in the Greek they call the perfect tense. It's not just a past tense verb, or a

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present tense verb. A Perfect tense verb is one where it has action that takes place in the past, but it continues to the present, and extends into and affects the future. We don't really have anything like that in modern day English. That's why we have these really weird verb tenses when we say during the Easter Season "He Is Risen..." In today's story Abraham declares Mount Moriah to be the "Place Where God Provided, where God provides, and where God will continue to provide." (SLIDE) That's a perfect tense verb, because Mount Moriah was the place where God provided, but also the place where God will provide the true means of grace in Jesus Christ. Of course, what Jesus accomplished on the mountain top of Calvary was completed 2000 years ago for us, but it was still a future event for those living at the time of Abraham and Isaac. God isn't finished yet either! The saving actions of Jesus continue to have affects on all those who believe in Jesus today, tomorrow, and forever.

Dear friends in Christ, may you know, in every season of life, the Lord who provided for Abraham, who provided in Christ, and who will also provide for you. Amen.
